	"The wind will <b>affect</b> our ferry journey."  "Jeremy's performance was <b>affected</b> by his cold."  "Mary's hair was <b>affected</b> by the rain."
	"Effect" is most often used as a noun (a thing).
	"The <b>effect</b> of the wind was to ruin our ferry journey."
	"Jeremy's cold had a serious <b>effect</b> on his performance."
	"The rain had a big <b>effect</b> on Mary's hair."
"Practice" or "Practise"? "Licence" or "License"?	"Practice" and "licence" are nouns.
	"With <b>practice</b> , Jeremy will improve his football." "Susie filled in a form to get her driving <b>licence</b> ."
	"Practise" and "license" are verbs.
	"Jeremy <b>practised</b> his football skills last night."  "Susie is now <b>licensed</b> to drive a car."
<b>"Fewer"</b> or <b>"less"</b> ?	"Fewer" is used if you can count the things e.g. items bought in a supermarket.
	"If you have <b>fewer</b> than 10 items you can use this till."  "Jeremy had <b>fewer</b> ideas than Susie."
	"Less" is used if you can't count the things e.g. dust on a road.
	"There is <b>less</b> dust on North Road than on London
	Road." "Jeremy's dad has <b>less</b> hair than Susie's dad."
<b>"Two", "too"</b> and <b>"to"</b> ?	"Two" is the easiest, it's the number.
	"Jeremy had <b>two</b> televisions in his house." "Susie was <b>two</b> years old when she first rode her bike."
	"Too" means an excess of something or as well as.
	"Jeremy had <b>too</b> many televisions in his house." "Susie found riding her bike <b>too</b> difficult at first."
	"To" is used at all other times, normally when a thing
	is involved.
